Training online sessions on the Third Optional Protocol to the Convention on the Rights of the Child a Communications Procedure (OPIC)

1. Context and purpose

Organised by the Global Initiative on Justice with Children¹, the World Congress on Justice with Children is an international platform and interactive space that gathers children alongside policymakers, legal practitioners, academics, and civil society representatives with relevant work experience to influence Child Justice, explore best practices, foster scientific cooperation, and raise awareness on child-friendly justice.

The next World Congress, under the title "Ensuring access to justice for all children: towards nondiscriminatory and inclusive child justice systems", will take place online from the 15th to the 20th of November 2021. The Congress is hosted by the Federal Mexican Supreme Court of Justice, with technical support from UNICEF, the Office of the Special Representative of the Secretary-General on Violence Against Children (SRSG/VAC), the United Nations Human Rights Office of the High Commissioner (OHCHR), the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), OECD, and Pathfinders for peaceful, just and inclusive societies. Over five days, attendees will participate in and contribute to plenary sessions, workshops, and master classes, alongside training and/or policy-oriented working groups.

Within the framework of this year's World Congress, on November 19, Child Rights Connect, as Friend of the World Congress, in close collaboration with members of the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child (the Committee) and experts from the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), is organising an online training session on the OPIC². After a brief presentation of the instrument, its mechanisms and recent trends, participants will be divided into two different groups. Each group will focus on two different topics:

- 1) the promotion of the OPIC's ratification
- 2) its strategic use and effective implementation by children's rights defenders, including children.

The OPIC is an international treaty that allows the Committee to hear complaints concerning the violations of child rights. Or in other words, it allows accountability for children's rights violations. It is a unique tool to strengthen the implementation of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) at the national level and it has great theoretical and practical importance in terms of enhancing access to justice for children at the international and national levels.

Indeed, the entry into force in 2014 of the OPIC and the subsequent development of relevant jurisprudence by the Committee have been a milestone for the recognition of children's rights to effective remedies and to enhance access to justice through an international child-sensitive mechanism that can fill the gaps at the national level.

The nearly universal ratification of the UNCRC raises expectation of equally high ratification of the Optional Protocols. However, to date, only 48 countries in the world have ratified the OPIC.³ As it was noted during the 2019 Roundtable discussion held on the occasion on the 5th anniversary of the OPIC's entry into force⁴ and again reminded at this year's Annual informal exchange between the Committee and States on the OPIC, the Protocol remains widely unknown, underused and/or largely misunderstood.

Therefore, and perhaps now more than ever, it becomes imperative to raise awareness and develop and disseminate more accessible information on the OPIC. To this end and following one of its four main strategic priorities⁵, Child Rights Connect has been developing and organising multiple capacity building workshops, trainings, and webinars to promote a better understanding of the OPIC, its increased ratification and effective use and implementation.

This online training on the OPIC at the 2021 World Congress certainly comes at a time where access to justice, as a central yet neglected child rights issue, is gaining momentum at the international level. Relevant discussions on this topic have taken place over this year, such as the 2021 HLPF side-event on Equitable access to justice for all children.⁶

2. Training objectives

Overall objectives for both training sessions:

- Raise awareness and promote a better understanding of the OPIC and its mechanisms
- Reinforce the existing link between access to non-discriminatory, child-friendly, and inclusive justice systems and the OPIC

In relation to the training session focused on the promotion of the OPIC's ratification, the objectives are to:

- Understand the added value of the instrument and analyse solid and evidence-based arguments on the benefits of the OPIC at a national level
- Understand the reasons behind non-ratification
- Share ratification and non-ratification experiences
- Discuss difficulties and challenges encountered in the process of ratification and possible solutions or ways to overcome them
- Identify critical success factors in the ratification campaigns and processes

In relation to the training session focused on the OPIC's strategic use and effective implementation, the objectives are to:

- Help participants identify and understand the essential requirements to be able to use OPIC's mechanisms
- Help participants understand the key strategic differences between OPIC's two main procedures: the individual communications procedure and the inquiry procedure
- Explain admissibility requirements for individual communications
- Allow for participants to raise any questions and/or concerns in relation to the OPIC and its strategic and effective use and implementation

5. Criteria for participation

After the initial presentation, participants will be divided in two different groups. To make this training session more profitable and useful for participants, we encourage participants to join only one of the groups according, inter alia, to the following criteria:

- a) The OPIC's ratification status of the State or States where participants develop their professional activity or have been or are working in. If participants developed or are developing their professional activity in a State that is only signatory or has taken no action towards ratifying the instrument, we encourage participants to join Group 1. Otherwise, if the State in question is party to the OPIC, we encourage participants join Group 2. - b) The OPIC's ratification status of the State or States participants are from or participants' country or countries of origin. If participants are from a State that is only signatory or has taken no action towards ratifying the OPIC, we encourage their participation in the training session focusing on the promotion of the OPIC's ratification (Group 1). Otherwise, if the State in question is party to the OPIC, we encourage participants to join Group 2.
